And this, from presumed Colonial Vinny Roth: "Here is a fun riff that sounds great over a G9 and works wonderfully in a blues-rock setting. The first part is based on a G9 arpeggio and moves up to a higher position G7 arpeggio. The use of slides and triplet rhythms help it groove while outlining the chord. The last section slides up to a G major pentatonic scale, capturing a cool B.B. King vibe. The bends in the final bar help send it home."
